## Reflections from the Interim Minister for the Moment

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Who Could Have Imagined?

I write this on the 103rd anniversary of my father's birth. He was born as World War I dragged on and in the midst of a flu pandemic. In 1918, who could have imagined what the next century would bring? Cars went from Flivvers to SUVs, 45 mph to as fast as we can get away with; from atom bombs and nuclear energy to solar cells on the roofs. Biplanes led to passenger jets, astronauts on the moon and a helicopter on Mars. Computers went from the abacus and adding machines to smart phones; movies from silents to live action and CGI. Jim Crow, the denial of civil and human rights for people of color eventually gave us civil rights legislation, the end of official segregation; and now renewed attempts to limit voting rights. Women couldn't vote when my father was born and now we have a woman as Vice President.

Who could have imagined how churches would grow in the 1940s, 50s and 60s? Who could have imagined the steady decline churches suffered from the 1980s through today?

For BCC, who could have imagined what would happen when Chuck Ericson retired? Who could have imagined that we would have to deal with a pandemic shut down, and how we would struggle and languish? Who could have imagined how people who care about BCC would step up and pull together, how they would do the hard work of trying to figure out what would come next?

Yet, that is where we are: deeply engaged in an intensive discernment, still trying to imagine what will come next. And making progress.

We have had about 15 Zoom sessions attended by 50 individuals over the past five months. We started with social gatherings (to practice the technology and get to know one another). We held a series of sessions where people embraced and remembered the joys of being part of BCC. More recently we had sessions where people voiced their sorrows and disappointments in regards to the church. This past Sunday, about 35 people gathered in Chandler Hall to talk. They spoke and listened respectfully, speaking of their own experience. People were engaged, honest and positive.

Most indicated they felt it had gone well despite people having and expressing differing opinions. The group expressed interest in more gatherings of the sort.

It is an exciting time to be part of BCC.

Who could have imagined?

I don't want to say I told you so, <wink> but I imagined it could happen, because I have seen God do it in other churches I have served. But more than that, it happened because God was able to imagine what could happen here. With God, all things are possible. Let's see what God imagines for what comes next. We may not be able to imagine it, but God sure can.

## Church School News

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Happy Spring! It is wonderful to see the trees blooming and the flowers popping up. It brings such hope. Finally after over a year of distance learning I am planning on how to bring Sunday School back to in person learning. Normally in mid-May we would take a break from Sunday School to allow the families to attend church together and prepare for what their summers will bring. This year we will be having Sunday School twice a month at the same time as church services. We will be having classes either in Chandler Hall or outside if the weather permits. This will enable us to remain socially distant and keep each other safe. We will have our first Summer Sunday School on Sunday June 6, 2021 at 9:30 and it will run until church services are over. All children pre-k - 8th grade are welcomed to attend; the older kids can either be helpers or participate as students. I am looking for High School age or parent volunteers as well depending on how many students we have in attendance. We will have rules in place. If for any reason the numbers of COVID cases start to go up again we will revisit the decision. Please be patient with me as I navigate how to do this to keep all the kids and myself healthy. ## Finance Committee Update

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April Financial Snapshot - Looking forward to May

Stop me if you heard this one: If April showers bring May flowers, what did the Mayflower bring? Oh, ok, you've heard it before. Sure, April has its daffodils, hyacinths and tulips, but to me, May is the month for sharing the joy which flowers bring.

Kids (at every age) welcome in May by gathering wild flowers to fill artfully decorated cups or cans, and with boisterous knocks or the doorbell rings, they leave their surprise to the delight of neighbors and friends. Mother's Day finds all sorts of flowering gifts, from bouquets to bulbs or shrubs in need of planting in just the right spot. Closing out May, showy petunias of red-white-and-blue help to commemorate loved ones on Memorial Day, this year celebrated on May 31st.

I hope May flowers lift will your spirits and brighten your day. In a sense, like the May flowers, as we shed the isolation of having to have been on hiatus, and we begin to gather together in our church's sanctuary, we are beginning to bloom again. By participating in the discernment process in order to prepare for the search and call of a settled pastor, the joy of our church family and the spirit of our congregation is spread throughout the community and we didn't even need to ring a door bell or run away.

Just an update on the April financial numbers to-date:

- April's monthly contributions are projected to be under budget by approximately \$2,500; Year to-date contributions of \$41,480 is approximately \$1,020 below projections; Thank you all for keeping up with your intentional giving throughout the year;
- We have received the Forgiveness letter from the SBA for the Paycheck Protection Plan Loan so \$20,470 is now considered income and is longer a liability to be paid back;
- Including the PPP Loan, the Year-to-date total Income through April is \$73,650, approximately \$720 below projections;
- Expenses are in-line with our year-to-date projection.
