Introduction

The Village of Morley developed a Park Plan in 1996 but no Plan has been in place since then. The Village Council would like to improve their parks and recreation activities but has not had the funding to accomplish this. Morley is a small village but has three parks in its village limits and additionally has the White Pine Trail through his center.

Community Description

The Village of Morley is located approximately 40 miles north of Grand Rapids in Mecosta County, and in an area referred to as West Central Michigan. Morley was established as a village in 1869 with the Grand Rapids and Indiana Railroad recording the first plat in 1870. Lumber was one of the earliest industries in the area.

A distinctive feature in the Village is the Little Muskegon River which flows through the Village to a dam that is owned by the Village. The impoundment behind the dam offers a great fishing area. Since there is only one boat launch, all fishermen with boats and recreational boaters use the Latimer Park Boat Launch.



Administrative Structure

Village Council

The Village Council Trustees and President are elected and govern the Village of Morley property. The Village Council has the authority to commit funds for parks and recreation, accept grants, and purchase land on behalf of the community. Council members include:

The table on page 5 is the 2024-25 general fund budget information for the Village of Morley. In fiscal year 2024-25, the budget for the Parks is just over \$28,000. This amount pays for the electricity and other maintenance of the three parks owned by the Village of Morley.

Recreation Inventory

The Village of Morley owns three dedicated parks: Latimer, Frank Deyo Dam Park, and Kinney Park.

Latimer Park is the oldest Village park, approximately 2.6 acres, and is located on a peninsula along the north bank of the Little Muskegon River at the south end of Webster Street. The park contains a boat ramp, pavilion with a fireplace, playground equipment and picnicking facilities. It once held a thriving beach area where youth spent their days in the sun and water.

Frank Deyo Dam Park is located at the southern end of the Village on Cass Street (Northland Drive) and contains the Village dam, and is approximately 1.5 acres in size which includes the dam structure. The Park features a War Memorial holding names of area veterans. The park contains a boat launch and is a popular area for fishermen.

Kinney Park was dedicated in 1996 and is in the center of town adjacent to the White Pine Trail. It is approximately 0.2 acres. A pavilion, benches, and picnic tables are popular locations during the summer.


Other Facilities in the Village of Morley

The railroad began to run trains from Grand Rapids to Morley in 1869. After the train tracks were removed in the late 1900s, the track area became the **White Pine Trail**. This trail is also an important linear "park" within the Village of Morley which is owned by the State of Michigan, and is used for hiking, bicycling, and snowmobiling. It was paved during 2023.

Morley Community Center is a volunteer, nonprofit organization that is revitalizing the old Morley School that was closed in 2012. The size of the facility and grounds is approximately 7.5 acres. Several ball fields and a playground are being maintained by the organization and they have recently installed an ice rink. A portion of the outside area is used for flea markets in the summer.

Following Maps: The map on page 8 reflects the existing recreational boating facilities in Mecosta County. The Village of Morley is uncertain as to the criteria of the facility requirements, but the Village has two boating access points. One is located at Latimer Park and the other in the alley behind the Cass Street stores. These access points have ramps and supporting infrastructure (noted on the map on page 7)

with stars). An unimproved water access location is also located at the dam area (2 on map on page 7).

Description of the Planning Methods

The following planning methods was used to develop this Five-Year Parks and Recreations Plan for the Village of Morley in accordance with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) guidelines.

Comparison to Recreation Standards.

Because of the size of the Village of Morley's three parks, they would all be considered "Mini-Parks" according to the MDNR "Recommended Classification System for Local and Regional Recreation Open Space and Trails" classifications. The Village of Morley parks are all contained within a residential area and are less than five acres. But with the population of Morley being just over 500, the acreage of the parks for our size of village is considerable.

According to the MDNR "Suggested Facility Development Standards", the Village of Morley statistics follow. The existing units are not exclusively property of the Village of Morley but are contained within the Village.

Public Input Process

Our original survey was initiated during the 2020-2021 COVID pandemic. Due to the COVID pandemic restrictions, much of the input process was done through surveys and emails.

A new survey was distributed in late 2023 and early 2024. It was accessible on Morley's website and advertised on Facebook. It was also distributed in the January 2024 newsletter and handed out to residents. The survey is included on the following page. Compilation of the survey (pages 13-16) was completed in March 2024.

Distribution of the Village of Morley Park & Recreation Plan will be conducted through the Village website. Notices of the availability of the Plan will be inserted in the April newsletter, Facebook, and Village kiosk. This review process will be provided for at least 30 days.

A public meeting will then be conducted in accordance with the Open Meetings Act. A resolution will be passed by the Village Council to complete the process.

Continual revitalization will keep families using the parks which will keep families close and revenue to the community. Evening lighting that better covers the park

More equipment for all age kids.

We need something to bring families to the parks, maybe bringing more families in would keep out the ones who just want to cause trouble.

We would love to see a dog park.

Grills and better setup for group gatherings.

I took my son to the Latimer park and the wooden equipment is broken. Like it was barley hanging on by a screw we had to screw back in my hand that would come out easy. I think it be better if we could get real park equipment that was made of metal. The swings I think are great, but maybe a teeter tator as well. Also, there is no where to park besides on the side of the road. Another concern I have is that the park is surrounded by water so having a better fence would also be really great because kids run off so fast. Other things that could be added could be, a sand box, things for kids to climb, maybe more equipment that toddlers could use. The only thing my son can really do is go down the slide or on the swings.

The only park that has anything for people to do is Latimer. It would be nice to see some play ground equipment at Kinney park as well, especially with the school doing the free lunches there in the summer.

Have a splash pad for summer fun.
